



How PSD will respond to COVID-19 cases

PSD will take different – but still health department-approved – approaches to contact tracing by grade level in the second semester. This work is done in partnership with LCDH

Enhanced contact tracing: Rather than Investigating and Identifying close contacts, all students in a classroom will shift to remote education for 10 days to prevent the possible spread of the virus. Staff members (homeroom teachers, paraprofessionals, etc.) identified as close contacts will also shift remote. All may return to school/work once cleared to do so. This is a change between first and second semester.

Targeted contact tracing: PSD COVID-19 Response Teams Investigate and identify possible close contacts (zero to X number); LCDHE issues orders to quarantine. Contact tracing happens in a classroom but also extends into lunchrooms, buses, athletics and other school-specific spaces.

Recognizing this challenge, the <u>Colorado Department of</u> <u>Public Health and Environment (CDPHE) and LCDHE allow</u> schools to seat students between 3-6 feet apart.



Why the change from targeted to enhanced contact tracing between first and second semester? We do not believe

PSD preschool/elementary COVID-19 Response Teams would be able to balance the significant workload of targeted contact tracing and keep our youngest learners in school all day, every day.

 Although we recognize the remote shift is disruptive, this approach reduces case response work and allows staff to have the time to consistently deliver full-time In-person education

 LCDHE will issue quarantine orders to students

Middle and high school – will follow targeted contact tracing

 Targeted contact tracing in secondary schools second semester will look like it did first semester.

 School COVID-19 Response Teams will Identify recommended possible close contacts of the infected individual and shift those people to remote teaching/ learning for an Initial Assessment Period with LCDHE.

At the end of the assessment period, LCDHE confirms close contacts and issues

quarantine orders (quarantine date may vary by person depending on exposure date to the positive individual). We believe targeted tracing is less
disruptive and more sustainable at the secondary level. Enhanced tracing is thought to be more difficult for secondary teachers to manage, who engage with multiple classes in a day, compared with

an elementary homeroom teacher who Interacts with one.



Spring Assessment 2021

CogAT -2^{nd} grade students will take this test in 3 parts over 3 days the week of <u>February 8th</u>. Each section takes approximately one hour and helps to identify students for the gifted & talented program.

ACCESS – Students in all grades also in our ELD program for emerging bilingual students will take this assessment to measure growth in English in the areas of listening, speaking, reading and writing. The assessment will begin <u>February 16th</u> and has 4 parts over 4 days.

The Art of Giving

S chools across the country are getting children as young as kindergartners and preschoolers involved in service learning a blend between community service and expanded instruction. Many service learning advocates feel that by helping others, children can learn responsibility, build character and citizenship, and discover the special joys of giving.

Clearly, with benefits like these, it's no wonder that more and more schools are making service learning part of the curriculum. But for it to really have an impact on children, it must be equally encouraged at home. Here are some ideas to try:

Start young. Encourage even the youngest children to look for ways to help others. There's almost always someone "littler" who needs a "big girl" or "big boy" to help or someone older who will, with a wink and a nod, be eager for a youngster

to "help" them with a job. Show that YOU care. Whether you can give an hour a day or an hour a month, let your children see you volunteer your time to help those in need. If you can, bring them along as


extra hands and let them see the smiles on the faces of the people you're helping. Go outside of your regular areas of interest.

For many families, the core of their charitable involvement is their church, temple, or mosque. If that's the case in your household, look around for occasional ways that you can step in to help others as well. "Giving times two" can help children grow up to be even more dedicated to helping others.

Use the news, but in moderation. Many children respond enthusiastically but very emotionally to crises, like hurricanes and other

Tap into their talents. Is your little one a budding chef? Encourage him to have a bake sale

to help a local family who lost their home in a fire? Do you have an artist in residence? See if she will submit a "masterpiece" to a charity putting together a fundraising calendar. And anyone can help pick up litter, give love to pets in a shelter, or read to children who just need some extra attention.

Make it a family affair. Everyone wins when the whole household gets involved in an effort to help others. Some families even make volunteering a part of their children's' weekly allowance requirements.

Cast-offs can be a first step. As your children outgrow toys, games, and clothes, make a big deal of how you're going to pass them on to others who need them—either younger relatives or charities, such as Goodwill or the Salvation Army. Encourage them to come with you when you drop the boxes off so they can hear the "thank you's" too.

Trade off. Invite your friends', relatives', or neighbors' children to join you when you're working on a project for others, and encourage them to ask your children along when they do service learning.

Service learning is not about accumulating hours that can be put on an application for college or a job. It's a commitment to helping your children learn how to make the world a better place.
